Dr. Calvin Bandt was an extraordinary physician, forensic pathologist and teacher. He practiced forensic medicine in the early days with Dr. John Coe and Dr. Kenny Osterberg. His passion was knowledge, a skill he applied to medicine, and in particular, pathology. He developed the Hennepin County Medical Center Clinical Labs and created the Hennepin County Medical Center Toxicology Lab. Along with Dr. Coe, he studied postmortem vitreous chemistry. His lifelong quest for knowledge, keen intellect, and passion for teaching illuminated the minds and shaped the lives of many. He is still sorely missed. This lecture is dedicated to his memory and his legacy.
